Victor is a member of VCCC Alliance and Western Health's Consumer Advisory Committee and is involved with the GOAL Mentoring Program and the Sons of the West under Western Bulldogs Community Foundation, a member of the Community Engagement Advisory Group under the Brotherhood of St. Laurence and African Representative Committee Member with Melton City Council.
