

2021 Intern Application Guide: Western Health

Internship at Western Health

Internship is an exciting time in every doctor's medical career. At Western Health, we provide an internship program to support your year from start to finish, and develop your skills, strengths and career interests.

In 2021 Western Health will be offering 62 intern positions.

How to apply

Applicants must apply to both the PMCV, and to Western Health, in that order.

The Postgraduate Medical Council of Victoria (PMCV) coordinates the intern match, by:

- Determining who is eligible for the match and which category they are in
- Receiving all applications for Victoria
- Setting out a standard CV format
- Hosting the online interviews via the Sonru platform [new for 2021]
- Calculating the match algorithm based on your preferences and the hospital preferences (both are essential for the match)
- Allocating candidates to positions

Note that hospitals cannot find out your preferences.

PMCV Intern Application and Computer Match Process

The candidate guide, important dates, interview details and other important information can be found at the <u>PMCV Allocation and Match Service</u>. As there have been several changes for the 2021 intern match it is strongly recommended that you read this information carefully before applying.

Candidates must register with the PMCV before applying to Western Health.

Western Health Intern Application Process

Applications must be submitted on-line via the Western Health Careers website (https://westernhealth.mercury.com.au/). Hard copies or emails cannot be accepted.

You will need to attach the following documents to your application:

- 1. Cover letter
- 2. Curriculum Vitae
- 3. Academic results (only if you are not a medical student at a Victorian medical school)
- 4. Western Health JMS Application Form (form is attached to the E-mercury advertisement)

Please ensure that you provide your PMCV Candidate ID number when submitting your application so your eligibility can be verified.

Preparing your application

A good application should reflect who you are and why you will be a good intern. There is no one 'type' of application that we are looking for. We are looking for diversity and a range of skills and attributes across our cohort of interns, which may include:

- teamwork and leadership
- contributions and connections to the community
- academic success and recognition of excellence
- relevant life experience

Cover Letter

A cover letter allows you the opportunity to highlight the personal qualities, values and achievements which would make you a good intern, and what makes you unique. In your letter you should specifically address why you wish to apply to Western Health and how you see yourself fitting within the hospital culture. Don't try to include everything. Be concise.

We suggest you limit your cover letter to one page using a font size at least 11 point. Please address your cover letter to Dr Sean Fabri, Supervisor of Intern Training, Western Health.

Curriculum Vitae

Your CV allows you the opportunity to showcase your skills and experience relevant to starting your medical career as an intern.

Please ensure you use the Standardised CV Template from PMCV.

Interview

Due to COVID-19, we will not be conducting in-person interviews in 2020. Interviews will now be centrally submitted via the PMCV using the Sonru platform.

** this information about the centralised PMCV interview process is correct as of the 5th May 2020, but is determined by the PMCV and is subject to change, so please refer to the PMCV website for updates and full details **

The PMCV Sonru online interview process is scheduled to take place on Thursday, 4 June 2020. You must have registered with the PMCV Allocation and Placement Service (APS) before this date. The interview duration will be 15 minutes, comprising 5 questions.

Practice interview sessions using the Sonru platform will be available from 28 May 2020. You must have signed up for the PMCV match to be sent the link to this site by the PMCV Allocation and Placement Service. These practice sessions may help you familiarise yourself with the process before the actual interview.

Selection Criteria

Candidates will be assessed based on the following criteria and weighting:

Video interview 40%
Academic results 40%
Cover letter and Curriculum vitae 20%

In 2020 Western Health offered 62 intern positions, with a substantial number of interns from every medical school in Victoria (Deakin University, Monash University, The University of Melbourne and The University of Notre Dame), as well as some from interstate.

Offers of Employment

We will notify successfully matched candidates in Round 1 via telephone on Monday 13 July. You will need to confirm your acceptance by 10 am on Thursday, 16 July 2020.

Dates for Round 2 & 3 offers are to be confirmed.

Rotation selection

Your internship will include five rotations: three core rotations in medicine, surgery and emergency medicine, and two other rotations, which can be preferenced from a broad range of training opportunities including general and specialty medical (eg cardiology, neurology, respiratory, infectious diseases) and surgical terms (eg orthopaedics, urology, plastics), as well as psychiatry, anaesthetics/perioperative medicine, and radiology.

Interns are based at our two main campuses in Footscray and Sunshine, in addition, each term two interns go on external rotation to Mildura (one in ED and one in the general surgical unit).

Shortly after you have successfully matched for internship at Western Health, we will provide you with a table which shows the 62 available positions with the specific combination of rotations. You can then preference your choices of positions from 1-62.

We use a computer algorithm and then check by hand to ensure the best match overall across all the interns. No candidate is given a higher priority for match of job compared to any other candidate.

There is naturally a lot of competition for popular jobs such as medical night cover, anaesthetics and orthopaedics. After the match and before the year starts, it is possible for interns to arrange to swap specific terms, as long as this does not affect the Medical Board of Australia requirements, and is approved by the Supervisor of Intern Training.

Commencement of Intern Year

Internship commences on Monday 4 January 2021 with a comprehensive five-day orientation program with skills training and shadowing of outgoing interns. Clinical duties commence on Monday, 11 January 2021.

Frequently Asked Questions

How long is the interview?

The interview consists of five questions within a 15 minute timeframe. It will be conducted online on Thursday, 4 June 2020. You must complete your online application on this day, and you MUST have registered with the PMCV Allocation and Placement Service (APS) before this date.

I didn't study at Western Health during my medical course. Will this affect my chances of being offered an intern position?

While it is helpful if you have completed rotations at Western Health, it is not a prerequisite. Over half of our current interns have not spent time here as a student.

Does Western Health only take students from the Western Clinical School of The University of Melbourne?

No. Over recent years the number of interns who trained at the Western Clinical School has ranged between 24-35 out of around 60 interns.

How many Priority Group 2 candidates does Western Health recruit?

This varies each year. In 2020, six Priority Group 2 candidates were successfully appointed to intern positions at Western Health.

How do you allocate rotations for the intern year?

Allocation of rotations is via preferencing against the list of 62 intern term rotations.

We use a computer algorithm and then check by hand to ensure the best match overall across all the interns. No candidate is given a higher priority for match of rotation compared to any other candidate. There is naturally a lot of competition for popular terms such as medical night cover, anaesthetics and orthopaedics. After the match and before the year starts, it is possible for interns to swap specific terms, as long as this doesn't affect Medical Board of Australia requirements, and is approved by the Supervisor of Intern Training.

How likely is it that I will have a rural rotation?

Two interns go to Mildura Base Hospital each term; one for ED and the other for General Surgery.

These rotations provide valuable learning opportunities, within a 165 bed rural hospital offering a wide range of services. Interns also have the opportunity to collaborate with interns who rotate to Mildura from Austin Health and Monash Health. Mildura Hospital provides free accommodation adjacent to the hospital.

What education opportunities are available for interns?

All interns have an hour of protected training time each week on Tuesday from 12:30-1:30pm, with lunch provided. (Currently due to Covid-19 these are conducted via Zoom, but we will resume face to face education as soon as possible to do so.)

Throughout the year, the Medical Education Unit organises a number of workshops on clinical procedures including suturing, plastering, lumbar puncture, ultrasound guided intravenous cannulation. Each intern is allocated to a deteriorating patient simulation session throughout the year, which are conducted in small groups. Our professional workshops are strongly focused on career progression, including preparing a cover letter & CV, job interview skills, and preparing for specific training pathways.

As well as the overall intern education program, each unit runs its own dedicated teaching sessions.

What teaching opportunities exist for interns?

Western Health hosts medical students from The University of Melbourne and The University of Notre Dame. There are many opportunities to become involved in informal teaching and in formal teaching roles.

Are there any research opportunities for interns?

Many of our clinical units are committed to research. In particular, Western Health is the home of the <u>Australian Institute of Musculoskeletal Science</u>, a collaboration between Western Health, The University of Melbourne and Victoria University.

Examples of Western Health research activity from AIMSS and other units can be seen in the Western Health Research <u>report</u> which is published by the Office for Research.

Because the year is busy, some interns prefer to plan and scope their research so they can begin projects in earnest in their HMO year.

Can Western Health accommodate requests for special leave such as a wedding, sporting competition events or defence forces commitments?

At Western Health we support a healthy work-life balance and we will work with you to meet your commitments. The best approach is to contact the Medical Workforce Unit as early as you can. This allows time to find a solution that will fit your needs and ensure safe patient care.

Can I apply for conference leave?

Western Health is committed to promoting your career progression and understands that attending and presenting at conferences is a part of this process. Each year, several interns attend important medical conferences around the world.

As interns are essential personnel, and there are no "spare" interns, each request for conference leave requires creative solutions. We will do our best to accommodate appropriate requests for conference leave, as long as we receive your request before 31 March 2021 to allow enough time for suitable arrangements to be made.

How is annual leave allocated for interns?

Interns are allocated annual leave at a set time. Two weeks leave will be allocated within the clinical year, usually in the Emergency Medicine term, and three weeks leave commences at the end of the intern year (17 January 2022), before the commencement of the HMO2 year.
