Western Health Specialist Clinics Access & Referral Guidelines

Growth and Nutrition Specialist Clinics at Western Health:

Western Health provides the following Specialist Clinic for patients <u>up to the age of 6 years</u> who require assessment and management of conditions causing Growth and Nutrition problems. Patients will be triaged by Consultant Paediatrician into management pathways according to specific clinical requirements. The majority of patients with feeding issues will be triaged into General Paediatric Medicine clinics, unless already linked in with a Paediatrician.

Referrals may be triaged to alternative Paediatric Specialist Clinics at Western Health

These referral guidelines are for Paediatric Specialist Clinics provided at Joan Kirner Women's and Children's at Sunshine Hospital only.

The clinic is facilitated by a multidisciplinary paediatric team comprised of a Paediatrician, Dietitian and Speech Pathologist.

The following conditions are managed within this clinic:

- Oral aversion
- Feeding tube dependence and weaning
- Faltering growth only refer if increases in caloric intake have not improved the condition.
- Fussy eating or restricted oral intake unless explained by their level of ASD.
- Difficulty transitioning to solids and/or texture progression.
- Feeding issues associated with food allergies and intolerances accepted on referral from Paediatrician or Allergist only.

Conditions not seen by Growth and Nutrition Specialists at Western Health:

- Eating disorders of adolescence
- Obesity without feeding issues.
- Children who are eligible for NDIS services to address their feeding conditions.
- Avoidant Restrictive Food Intake Disorders please refer to Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) in your local region

Growth and Nutrition Alarm Symptoms:

Acute conditions requiring immediate assessment such as complete food or fluid refusal.

Please refer the patient to the Sunshine Hospital Emergency Department.

Access & Referral Priority Growth and Nutrition: The clinical information provided in your referral will determine the triage category. The triage category will affect the timeframe in which the patient is offered an appointment.
