Plastic & Reconstructive Surgery Adult Specialist Clinics at Western Health:

Western Health provides the following Adult Specialist Clinics for patients who require assessment and management of plastic surgical conditions. Patients will be triaged by Consultant plastic surgeons into management pathways according to specific clinical requirements.

Conditions not seen by Plastic & Reconstructive Surgery Specialists at Western Health:

Referrals regarding the following conditions are not accepted:

- · Cosmetic surgery for non-medical reasons
- · Revision surgery following previous or initial cosmetic surgery
- Benign skin lesions not causing functional problems or significant disfigurement

Plastic & Reconstructive Surgery Alarm Symptoms:

Acute injury:

- Burn injuries which are extensive, involve special areas (face, hands, perineum), or meet the criteria for referral should be discussed with the Victorian Adult Burns Service (The Alfred)
- Extensive or multi-trauma injuries are best managed at a tertiary trauma centre (Royal Melbourne Hospital or The Alfred)

Access & Referral Priority: Plastic & Reconstructive Surgery

The clinical information provided in your referral will determine the triage category. The triage category will affect the timeframe in which the patient is offered an appointment.
