Patient Information Sheet No 1 Department of Medical Imaging

Computed Tomography(CT) Examination



This information sheet will help to answer some of your questions about your CT scan.

What is a Computed Tomography (CT) scan?

A CT scan is taken by a computer scanner that takes picture of your body in "slices".

What will happen?

You will be lying down on a special tabletop which will slowly move through the opening of the CT scanner. It is important that you stay still during your scan.

How long will it take?

This will depend on how many pictures your doctor has asked us to take, but it could be anywhere between 10 minutes to one hour.

Will I need a needle?

We may need to give you an injection of a dye into your arm. This dye will help us to see organs and other parts of your body.

Are there any side effects from the dye?

Side effects are rare but some people may

- feel a warm sensation and/or a bitter taste in the mouth from the dye
- feel sick or dizzy

If at any time during your scan you fell unwell, please tell a staff member.

If you have ever had an injection with a dye in the past and you have felt unwell please tell our staff before your scan or procedure.



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You also may experience some side effect when you are home.

These can be

- tenderness where you have had the injection
- swelling of the arm
- an infection or a blood clot

If you feel unwell after you have gone home go to your GP immediately.

Will a CT scan expose me to radiation?

All scans and x-rays deliver radiation doses. A CT scan does deliver more radiation than a normal x-ray but it is a similar amount to what you receive every year from the natural environment.

Western Health Medical Imaging staff will ensure that all patients receive the least amount of radiation necessary during your scan. If you would like more information on the risks of medical radiation exposure, please ask a staff member.

Can I have a CT scan if I am pregnant?

Yes, it is possible for pregnant women to have a CT scan. Please let us know so that we can ensure the baby receives the minimum amount of radiation or, determine if another type of scan is more suitable.
